Snow Globe Tie-On (4 ½" x 5 ½")

Materials:

- Lightweight fusible web
- Wools: 5" x 6" black for the background

4" x 4" grey

2 1/4" x 4" brown

2" x 3" white

1 %" x 2" each of two greens

 $1\,\%"\times1\,\%"$ black for the hat

1 1/3" x 1 1/3" red

- 5" x 6" homespun for the backing
- Threads to match wools

Trace shapes onto the paper side of fusible web.
Cut out just outside the traced lines and iron to the wool.
Cut out on traced lines and remove the paper from the web.
Position shapes on the black background, fusible side down.
When placing shapes, tuck some slightly under others as indicated by dotted lines on the drawing.
Fuse shapes in place and blanket stitch around them.



Add the following details:

- With black, stitch the snowman's face-French knots for the eyes, tiny satin stitches for the nose 🙀 and tiny backstitches for the mouth. Add three French knots for buttons on his belly.
- Add random ivory French knots to represent snow falling in the globe.
- familiar with any of these, google "How to transfer embroidery designs to wool" wool. Among the possible methods are using tulle fabric, Tear Easy, or Press and Seal. If you aren't Optional: Stitch the "to and from" on the base of the snow globe, using black and tiny back stitches. You may free hand the lettering or use your favorite method of transferring embroidery designs to

If you wish to stitch names, do so in your own handwriting.

This area may also be left plain but still used as a package tie-on or a tree ornament

leaving about ¼" of the black showing all around the snow globe. the paper and fuse to the back of the project. With small sharp scissors, trim away the excess background, When stitching is complete, cut a 4" x 6" piece of fusible web and iron it to the homespun backing. Remove

Use black to blanket stitch all around the outside edge and add a hanger to the top.
